EU document on Land Policy: Conclusions

- 7. INVITE the Commission, together with the Member States and in consultation with relevant UN agencies, to reflect further on urban land issues as well as on a better integration of rural and urban land matters;
- 12. INVITE the Commission and the Member States to enhance their collaboration and coordination in support of participatory land policy design and reform processes in developing countries on the basis of the principles laid out ..., to reflect them in their own development policies and apply them in their development cooperation programmes.

EU document on Land Policy: Communication (2004) 686

Land Policy is integrated into

EU document on Land Policy: Communication (2004) 686

Given Europe's experience and substantial funding in land policy,.. support to family farming and regulation of land markets, the EU has a major role to play in international debates and in development policy regarding land tenure and land regulations. Such a role needs to take a balanced approach, recognising that markets are not the only means to achieve social ends. (Page 8)

EU document: Land Policy Guidelines

Mapping, cadastre "may play a role" (:18), if not too expensive (:35)

Land registration should await handling of "conflicting claims" (:10), and be locally accessible (:15)

Procedures should be "simple, inexpensive and perceived to be reliable" (:18)

"Local land taxes may be legitimate..[if]..effective provision of services by the local government. (:12)


